

RABBI'S REFLECTIONS:

Rabbis, Doctors, Epidemics, Saving Life, Pesah

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Rabbi Michael Rascoe

People tell a story, probably only vaguely true, about Rabbi Israel Lipkin (1810-1883), more popularly known as Rabbi Yisrael Salanter. He founded the Musar Movement (Ethical), and was one of the many well-known Lithuanian rabbis of Vilna. The story is that during

what became known as the second cholera outbreak (there have been 8 in modern times) in 1848, on Yom Kippur afternoon he ended a short sermon by giving everyone permission to eat, and in some versions made the blessing for a roll and ate it. He then told people to stroll outdoors.

The story only appeared decades later, and was not told by anyone there. It is probably exaggerated. More likely, he listened to doctors who either told him that eating would keep strength up (the germ theory, not widely accepted, nor would they know anything about bacteria for an-

other 40 years), or that a walk in the fresh air would mitigate the vapors (the miasma theory, that the disease was transmitted by filth and decay through the air or soil; they didn't understand medicine as we do, but in this case a bit of both helped). He probably just told people that they could eat, and might even have set aside a room where they could eat, and told them to walk.

There are rules that a seriously ill person who either by his/her own treatment plan, or a doctor who prescribed something to keep a person alive, can eat on Yom Kippur. The Salanter extended this to a healthy person on the advice of doctors, to keep people from dying. He, as did many rabbis, understood that in times of epidemics, when large numbers of people died, one could act in ways that one otherwise would never do, and that this did not set a precedent for any lowering of standards, since it applied only to this case during an extreme circumstance.

We talk, as Jews, about *piqu-ah nefesh*, saving life, overriding all. For a sick individual, it's true, with some exceptions. For a whole community, much less so; and in his case, not everyone agreed. They pointed to the fact that many fasted and survived. As I pointed out, there are limits; which I won't go into.

We're in the midst of another pandemic; in some ways this one is unique both positively and negatively. I am

not referring to Ayatollah Khamenei's blessing, but positive in the sense that we know more about this faster than any previous outbreaks, and may be creating a vaccine in record time for something about which we had never known before. The negative is that for all that we know about it biologically, we know little about what it will do and why it does what it does. The Spanish Flu was one of the deadliest pandemics in history, killing about 2.5% of infected people, and infecting perhaps a third of the people. COVID-19 in the early days was about 2% mortality, and may show signs of going down, but it does not compare to the flu, which, while it kills more people per year historically, only has a death rate of 0.1%.

Which means that out of an abundance of caution, we have canceled plenty of things. Stay tuned. If we all do our part, this could be over by Pesah. Alas, since observing Passover is not a matter of life or death, the holiday will still happen, with all of its observances, whether we have services or a seder, or not. Gatherings might need to be limited.

In any case, please observe the precautions of washing thoroughly, disinfecting, social distancing, etc. as these are likely to still to be in effect when this bulletin is published, though hopefully for not much after it.

May you have a happy, healthy, and kasher Pesah.

Notes from our Rabbi

Pesah Instructions: If you wish Pesah help, e.g. what food requires rabbinic certification (a *hekhsher*), how to *kasher*, conduct a seder, a minimal list of what to cover, what the seder means, more contemporary readings, formulae to be recited, and other information, contact me.

Bedikat <u>hametz</u>. Search for leaven on Tuesday, April 7, after 7:23 PM. The search is important, not whether you find something. Traditionally people set aside <u>hametz</u> for children to find by candlelight and sweep onto a wooden spoon using a feather or last Sukkot's *lulav*.

Ta'anit/Siyyum Bekhorim. On the day leading into Pesah, Wednesday, April 8, the firstborn (bekhorim) fast (ta'anit) to express their gratitude for God's saving them from the tenth plague. But all who are at a se'udat mitsvah (a meal accompanying a religious celebration) must eat, so the custom arose to finish a Talmudic tractate (siyyum) this morning, so even the firstborn present must break their fast. We do not have one. This year it might only be online.

Mekhirat <u>H</u>ametz, kashering, eating. The last time to sell (mekhirat) <u>h</u>ametz (leaven), kasher the kitchen, and eat <u>h</u>ametz is Wednesday, April 8, at 10:47 AM. A form to utilize my services is on the next page. It is preferred to do it in person, but mail is fine. Please allow time, especially if you mail it to the Temple (we only pick up mail Tuesdays and Fridays by 10 AM), and mail to the house arrives too late on Friday for me to sell it. You may mail or give me the form as soon as you receive it. Please make sure that I have the form delivered by mail by Tuesday, April 7. Please wait until 8:00 PM on Thursday, April 16 for me to buy back the hametz.

Bi'ur <u>Hametz</u>. The burning/disposal (*bi'ur*) of <u>hametz</u> and its nullification formula must be recited by Wednesday, April 8, at 11:47 AM.



This will mark the fourth year that we will participate in the **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program**. We hope you will join other members of Temple Israel of Riverhead on Sunday, April 20th, erev Yom HaShoah, and light this special candle in memory of the victims of the Holocaust; then join us at Temple Israel on Sunday, April 26th, at 2 PM, for a joint program with the East End Jewish Community Council.

The act of kindling this flame, and reading the enclosed meditation, can be a moving ritual to remind us of what happened to our people not so long ago. Placing the candle in your window is a way to help remind the community. This moment can also be an appropriate opportunity to discuss the Holocaust with your children.

The **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program** is a project of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs, in cooperation with the Men of Reform Judaism and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

It is our hope that the observance of Yom HaShoah, centered on the lighting of a Yellow Candle, will become an annual event in your home and in the home of every member of our congregation. Many congregations have already made this commemoration an important day in their Jewish calendar.

We ask that you help underwrite the cost of this project. Funds received over and above our program cost will go directly to support future educational programs in our synagogue, helping to insure the future of our people. We ask that you consider gifts in multiples of \$18. The number 18 is *chai*, Life.

By remembering, by doing our part to insure our future, we celebrate the ongoing life of our people, even as we memorialize those destroyed in the Shoah. We welcome and appreciate your support of our efforts in this commemoration and our on-going education programs.

The Yellow Candle™ Program - A History

Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel, and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades, survivors asked another question: How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with yellow wax, in remembrance of the yellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.



The Yellow CandleTM was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New England, and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Million. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe.

For Jewish people, remembering a victim is a great mitzvah.


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Leaves on the Tree of Life
