

#### **RABBI'S REFLECTIONS:**

'An'im Zemirot': On God, Reality, Science, & Religion

Shavuot is about God's revelation. Prayer and behavior are the two human responses. One prayer that I have loved since childhood is called Shir Ha-Kavod, "Hymn of Glory," also known as 'An'im Zemirot from its opening words. To me, this song from the mystical tradition

(attributed to Judah the Hasid or his father Samuel, 12th century German Pietists, Hasidei Ashkenaz) addresses some fundamental philosophical issues which, with some reinterpretation, may shed light on certain problems we have today: God, reality, prayer, history, philosophy, psychology, and revelation. "Hymn of Glory" is an alphabetical acrostic with a four verse prologue and a four verse epilogue. Each line contains sixteen syllables and consists of two half-lines which rhyme. The poet shifts person at various points. He opens by

stating his intention to "weave" together verses in rhyme and meter into a hymn. He sings of his longing for God and of his need to glorify God. At the same time he acknowledges that, philosophically, God is transcendent (far away and out of reach); yet he also uses highly anthropomorphic (human) and immanent (near and touchable) images like God's hands, tefillin, black hair. He images God as young warrior and as an elderly judge. The poet also writes about Jerusalem, salvation, and the eternal righteousness of God's laws.

The hymn is a conscious, serious attempt to appropriate ancient, anthropomorphic symbols of the revelatory God of Torah and mystical knowledge. Being Biblical, he affirms both the unreachable, unknowable, unimaginable, transcendent God and the caring, active, understandable, immanent God. He cannot give up either one. Both explain reality. The transcendent God is a logical, reasoned, scientific, and philosophical need; the immanent God a psychological, emotional, spiritual, and religious need. The poet accepts the paradox of the seemingly logical contradiction of both realities. He reasons that since God is simple and not natural, God is everything, and precisely because God is nowhere, God is everywhere. To us, with the assumption of a scientific, logical world and the beginning of an understanding that science still cannot explain all of reality, we too can accept the paradox and find meaning in affirming both our

minds and our emotions. (I'm not discussing the mystical meaning and allusions).


Prayer fits into this scheme. Logically, prayer to a transcendent God is irrelevant, but religiously, prayer is necessary and must involve God. In fact, to speak of God requires using human language. Once we use human language, it stands to reason that the more intense the religious experience, the more concrete the language needs to be to express our encounter, even as we acknowledge the inadequacy of language to fully capture the experience. In doing so, we also unite the God of history and the God of revelation. The two images of young warrior and older judge reflect the union of Torah and history, mitzvah and salvation.

Embedded in this scenario, according to the structure of the poem, we find the Jew's role in the really real. History and Bible affirm the Jew's high place, while daily life emphasizes the Jew's low status in the surrounding world. A Jew doing prayer, Torah, mitzvot to a responsive, revealing God, who will judge in history once again, will redeem the Jew and the world at time's end.

These concerns of God, history, prayer, behavior (mitzvot), and salvation are in the realm of religion and have been since the beginning of human thought. The contradiction between the reality of religion and the reality of science for many still remains today.

Maybe we can hold these contradictory ideas at the same time if each explains reality (like we believe that Newtonian physics works on one level of reality while quantum mechanics works on another level of reality). May we too comfortably talk about and to God as this poet once did.


