
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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS:

Chinese Calendar and Judaism

There's a joke that Chinese culture is older than Judaism, or where would Jews have eaten? A congregant recently asked about the Chinese New Year (Pig, year 12 of the 12-year cycle,) which began on Rosh <u>H</u>odesh (New Moon) Adar 1 (Feb 5.) The Chinese New Year normally begins on Rosh

<u>H</u>odesh Adar, or sometimes on the previous month, Rosh <u>H</u>odesh Shevat. They both use a calendar adjusted to both the sun and the moon.

Much of the world uses the Gregorian calendar, a solar calendar based on the earth's circling the sun, in almost 365 1/4 days. Islam uses a lunar calendar based on the moon's circling the earth, in just over 354 1/3 days. All divide a year into 12 months of 24-hour days, but a lunar month is just over 29 1/2 days, so the months are 29 or 30 days, while a solar month is mostly 30 or 31 days. Until recently, a daytime hour was the amount of daylight divided into 12 parts, then divided by 60, so a summer "hour" can be 70 clock minutes long, and a winter "hour" 45

minutes. Night was likewise divided. Now we use a clock hour, not a sundial. This is why Jews traditionally wait varying times to end Sabbaths and festivals, at different times of the year. For those who wait a set number of minutes, someone calculated the longest day's end and one waits that long after sunset every holy day in order to avoid a weekly calculation.

This matters, because if Jews and Chinese had not changed the lunar calendar, we would be like Muslims, and holidays over time would fall in every season. But in Judaism, Pesah, and Sukkot (Passover and Booths) must fall near the equinox, when day and night are equal; and holidays must also typically fall on the full moon or near the new moon. Same with the Chinese. Both calendars add a month to solve this problem, which is why the Chinese New Year usually falls on, but occasionally just off, the Jewish New Months of Shevat or Adar. Jews add one month 7 times in 19 years (years 3, 6, 8, 11, 14, 17, 19,) and the Chinese add a new month about every three years. Jews add the month at the end of the year, and it has the last month's name (Adar,) while the Chinese add the month so that month 11 always includes the winter solstice, and it too has the preceding month's name. Thus, both years are 353-355 or 383-385 days long.

Jews add the month at the year's end, though Rosh Hashanah, the New Year marking the world's creation, starts the seventh month, Tishri. Tishri originally was the first month, but when God took the Israelites from Egypt, He, like all kings, started the new reign with a new year. So, Nisan became the first month and Adar became the last month; but the year's number still changes when the world was created in Tishri. Since Purim must be one month before Pesah, it always falls in Adar 2.

The year's length varies by a few days, because the moon circles the earth in over 29 1/2 days, so some months are 29 days and some 30. Nisan, Sivan, Av, and Tishri are a "full" (malei) 30 days, as are Shevat and Adar 1 in a leap year. We call both day 30 and day 1 of the next month Rosh Hodesh. Iyar, Tamuz, Elul, Tevet, Adar 2, and Adar non-leap year always "lacking" (haser,) and Rosh Hodesh is only day 1. Heshvan and Kislev either can be 29 or 30 days. Since Rosh Hashanah must begin on the new moon and some holidays falling on certain days causes problems, like Yom Kippur on Friday or Sunday or

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1375 Old Country Road Riverhead, N.Y11901 Phone (631) 727-0555 Fax (631) 727-8453 Hoshanah Rabbah on Shabbat, we sometimes add one day to Kislev so it is 30 days, and the next year subtract a day from Heshvan so it is 29 days.

Three more notes: the prayer for rain in the *Amidah*, the Standing Silent Devotional, begins 60 days after the fall equinox. We bless the sun every 28 years on Wednesday morning when we first see it, to recall the fall equinox supposedly recurring at the same time as the first Nisan, Tuesday at 6 PM. The calculations occurred almost 2,000 years ago, and a

perpetual calendar developed once we no longer relied on observation to set the new moon, so now we just look at a calendar.

Jewish and Chinese calendar parallels are just a coincidence. Neither can allow the lunar cycle to deviate far from the solar one. Jewish time really exists, but it is just a joke that on Jewish time we always start things late unless we're German, punctilious, and punctual.

This will mark the third year that we will participate in the **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program**. We hope you will join other members of Temple Israel of Riverhead and your family on Wednesday May 1st, erev Yom HaShoah, and light this candle in memory of the victims of the Holocaust.

The act of kindling this flame, and reading the enclosed meditation, can be a moving ritual to remind us of what happened to our people not so long ago. Placing the candle in your window is a way to help remind the community. This moment can also be an appropriate opportunity to discuss the Holocaust with your children.

The **Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program** is a project of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs, in cooperation with the Men of Reform Judaism and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

It is our hope that the observance of Yom HaShoah, centered on the lighting of a Yellow Candle, will become an annual event in your home and in the home of every member of our congregation. Many congregations have already made this commemoration an important day in their Jewish calendar.

We ask that you help underwrite the cost of this project. Funds received over and above our program cost will go directly to support future educational programs in our synagogue, helping to insure the future of our people. We ask that you consider gifts in multiples of \$18. The number 18 is *chai*, Life.

The Yellow Candle™ Program - A History

Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel, and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades, survivors asked another question: How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with yellow wax, in remembrance of the yellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.



The Yellow CandleTM was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New England, and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Million. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe.

For Jewish people, remembering a victim is a great mitzvah.






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Leaves on the Tree of Life


