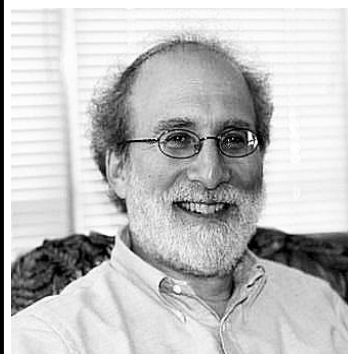

Rabbi Michael Rascoe

Some of you might recall the TV series *Babylon 5*, which won two Hugo awards (against such competition as *Toy Story*, *Apollo 13*, *Independence Day*, *Star Trek: First Contact*). In discussing one key episode, creator J (oseph) Michael Straczynski said about two fundamental questions being asked of humanity, “Who are you?” and “What do you want?”:

My feeling was that you have to first know who you are before you know what you want. If you define what you want first, then the question of who you are is bent by your desires....That’s where humans come in, with the other questions: “Why are you here?” and “Where are you going?” because those two questions look to define the larger picture.

Religion in particular also asks these questions, and two others: “Why me?” and “To whom do I turn?”

Human beings want a meaningful life, and so we create one. Most of us find meaning in religion (likely if you’re reading this). If not, we make it up (likely for those not reading this). Some solutions satisfy more than others.

We then concretize and reinforce our worldview with rituals. Religious people do, but so do secularists, governments, social groups, etc. One strength of religion is that it unifies everything (something Einstein tried to find in an equation, of which the theory of relativity was a major part).

Rosh Ha-shanah is called the “birthday of the world”, actuality humanity’s birthday (*TB Sanhedrin 38b*). A teacher, Fritz Rothschild, once answered why we speculate about creation: if the earth were made of dung, we wouldn’t worry about it; if it were made of gold, we would protect it. (It isn’t true if you think about it, but on the surface, it works.) Since God created the world, Judaism says that we must take good care of it. Moreover, God purposefully fashioned it incomplete, so we must work to improve it, something we would not do if it were made of either dung or gold. With humanity at the pinnacle of creation, we have the most responsibility. Aqaviah ben Mahalal’el’s said (*Pirquei Avot 3:1*):

Ponder three things and you will avoid falling into sin: Know your origin, your destination, and before whom you will be required to give an accounting. Your origin? A putrid drop. Your destination? A place of dust, worms, and maggots. Before whom will you be required to give an accounting? Before the Ruler of rulers, the blessed Holy One.

While we don’t actually read it on the High Holidays, it fits the themes despite not being encouraging, and dismissing our strengths. They temper joy with sadness, sin with forgiveness, an old year of disappointments and frustrations with a new one of hope and promise. At least once a year we slow down the tempo of our lives and think about larger issues in order to reassess and improve. We are human beings created in the Divine image. God, therefore, expects us to better ourselves and the world. God reminds us to consider our status and goals. To be worthwhile, our lives must be about more than ourselves, our happiness, and our belongings. God reminds us of this, provides the solace when things do not turn out as we wish, support to keep us going, and hope for the future.

Lshanah tovah tikkatevu v'tehatemu. May you be inscribed for a good (and healthy) year.

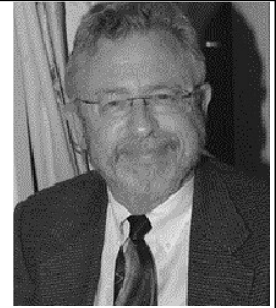

Dear Fellow Congregant:

Looking forward to the High Holy Days, we thought you would like an explanation of Temple Israel's High Holy Day ticket process.

With membership, families receive two adult tickets and tickets for all children under age 21. Additional tickets for children over the age of 21 may be purchased for \$100 each. Tickets for other adult family members are available at \$140 each. Non-members may purchase tickets at \$350 each.

According to the Temple's long-standing practice, we make High Holy Day seats available at no charge to needy individuals, full-time college students, and active military personnel.

To be courteous and fair to everyone, we ask that you consider the following information:

1. Each person attending High Holy Day services must have a ticket. Tickets are issued for specific seats, and you are expected to occupy the seat designated on your ticket.
2. Tickets are non-transferable.
3. Inter-married spouse members and individual members may reserve tickets for themselves, their spouses, and their children.
4. Each year, all but a few seats are reserved in advance; please do not assume that an unoccupied seat is available.
5. Tickets cannot be purchased for non-relatives at the member rates.

We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in adhering to the spirit of our ticket process. We are all working diligently to make our High Holy Day services meaningful and dignified.

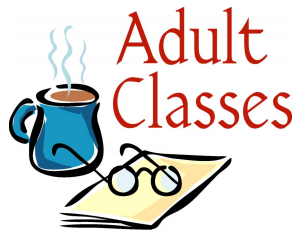

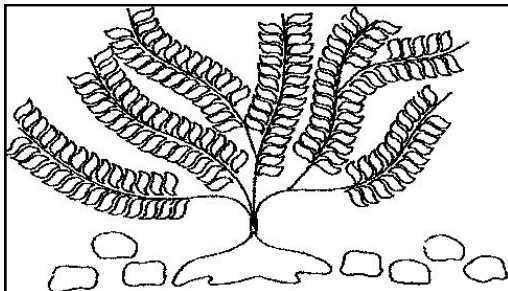

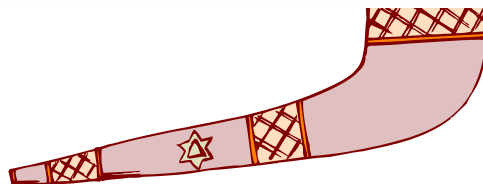
