



RABBI'S REFLECTIONS:

From Darkness to Brilliant Sunshine, in an Instant







Rabbi Michael Rascoe

Some of you had the privilege to hear Rabbi Jack Shlachter's presentation on the Jews involved in the Manhattan Project at Los Alamos. Following on this theme, J. Robert Oppenheimer named the first atomic blast test "Trinity," inspired by the poems of John Donne. Ernest O.

Lawrence wrote of the first reactions to the test by those present: "The grand, indeed (sic) almost cataclysmic (sic) proportion of the explosion produced a kind of solemnity in everyones (sic) behavior immediately afterwards. There was restrained applause, but more a hushed murmuring bordering on reverence in manner...." quickly followed by surprise, joy, and relief. Hans Bethe, who had been looking directly at the explosion, was completely blinded for almost half a minute. Norris Bradbury reported that "the atom bomb did not fit into any preconceptions possessed by anybody." The blast wave knocked George Kistiakowsky (who was over five miles away) to the ground. He quickly

scrambled to his feet and slapped Oppenheimer on the back, saying, "Oppie, you owe me ten dollars." The physicist Victor Weisskopf reported that "our first feeling was one of elation." Isidor Rabi said, "jubilant." Rabi reported that after the initial euphoria, a chill soon set in on those present. The test director, Kenneth Bainbridge, called the explosion a "foul and awesome display," and remarked to Oppenheimer, "Now we are all sons of bitches."

Expressions of horror and remorse generally came in the later writings of those present. Oppenheimer wrote that the experience called to mind the legend of Prometheus, punished by Zeus for giving humanity fire. He also said that he thought fleetingly of Alfred Nobel's vain hope that dynamite would end wars. Most famously, Oppenheimer later recalled that the explosion had reminded him of a line from the Hindu holy text, the Bhagavad-Gita: "Now I am become Death, the destroyer of worlds." Some, like Lawrence, expressed regret at the loss of life, but felt that the dropping of the bombs saved more lives than would have been lost. The most pessimistic observer admitted, "I thought to myself, 'This is the kind of flash the last man will see the last fraction of a second before the world ends."

One interesting reaction was by William L. Laurence, the *New York Times* science reporter. He said that he thought, "This is the kind of flash when the Lord said, 'Let there be light."

I write not to discuss the morality, which would involve much more material, including Hitler's race to the bomb; Heisenberg's role, which has generated much discussion; the complicated role of Japanese society; etc. I note that most moral discussion came later. What's interesting are the different reactions, one of which recalled the Biblical proportions of the event. This is the closest humanity has come to God -like power, and note that it is destructive (though atomic power can have constructive uses). Yet at the same time, if we think about it, the Big Bang was much more massive. Science fiction, some science and midrash to the contrary, we will never know if it was creative or destructive. Yet this kind of atomic power is God-like in a way unmatched so far in human history.

Besides my interest, which Rabbi Jack's talk provoked, and the marking of the anniversary of the dropping of the atomic bombs, is that Rosh Hashanah marks the birthday of the creation of the world. Technically Rosh Hashanah marks the creation of humanity,


Services begin promptly at 9:30 AM, with a minyan, and end at 11:00 AM.

Indeed, there is a debate in the Talmud as to whether creation of the world occurred in Tishri (Rosh Hashanah), or in Nisan, (the month in which Pesah, Passover, the redemption from Egypt), occurs. Of course, tradition decided that it occurred in Tishri and now it is commemorated by Rosh Hashanah.

Every day, we see an event of similar proportion and perspective. The sun rises, and we, even in the midst of electric lights, will acknowledge it in one way or another, whether religiously with prayer, or grudgingly with work, or these days perhaps depressively, with thoughts of pandemic in mind. How we choose to see the new day in the new light is up to us as individuals, and also as a society. Rosh Hashanah suggests that we see it with hope. In the light of Rosh Hashanah, we can see the new day as an act of mercy, love, understanding, and truth, to borrow imagery from many *midrashim*. The new light can illumine the world with faith and confidence. It can be seen through the lens of moral deeds. We can also see it as a foreshadowing of the messiah (for all of these images, see *Bereshit Rabbah* Ch. 1-2). Through the lenses of Rosh Hashanah and the daily prayer book, we can see the renewal of the world and the hope inherent in the daily renewal of creation in a world full of light, and still see a world full of promise, faith, and confidence, in a covenant with God.

L'shanah tovah tikkatevu v'tehatemu. May you be inscribed in the book of life for a happy and healthy year. Michael

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
