

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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS On Latkes/Donuts and Miracles, Then and Now

To publicize the miracle of Hanukkah, we light the hanykkiyah, the 8/9-branched candelabrum often called a menorah. What miracle are we publicizing? The earliest miracle refers to the military victory in First Maccabees, and appears in the additions to the Amidah,

the Standing Prayer, and Birkat Ha-mazon, Grace After Meals. The more well-known one, the story of one day's oil in the rededicated 7-branched Temple menorah lasting for 8 days, first appears in the Talmud. We eat foods made with oil, for us latkes or donuts, in honor of this later story. Other traditions enjoy berenjenas con miel, deep-fried eggplant rounds; bußuelos, a light-as-air fried dough; frituras de malanga, taro fritters; gulam jamun, deep-fried milk balls; keftes de prasa/espinaca, leek/spinach fritters patties; malawach, flaky fried flatbread; samsa, sweet fried dumplings; sfenj, deep-fried yeast donuts; jalebi, crispy fritters like funnel cakes; rosquitas, circular fried pastries; tostones, twice-fried smashed plantains; panelle, fried chickpea fritters; platanos fritos, fried sweet plantains; or zalabia, fried dough.

The oil reflects the Talmudic story, but

may teach another lesson: food requires human work. By adding effort to the oil, we refer to another Talmudic dictum: we do not rely on miracles (Shabbat 32a, Ta'anit 20b, P'sahim 64b). Maybe food tells us that we can't rely on miracles alone. Miracles only happen if we act first. A popular Israeli folk saying was that if you don't believe in miracles, you're not a realist. We should understand it alongside a saying by Chaim Weitzman, Israel's first President: "Miracles sometimes occur, but one has to work terribly hard for them." A miracle begins with great human effort. This initial human effort underlies the Hanukkah story miracle. Hanukkah means dedication, indicating the Temple's rededication. It required a group of dedicated Jews who fought to make it happen against the odds by opposing a superior force. But it wasn't just the Seleucid army and King Antiochus the 4th Epiphanies, it was a revolt against other Jews with a different view of Judaism. They assimilated much Greek culture into their Judaism. They adopted Greek gods, Greek language, Greek sports, Greek dress, and Greek names. They limited Shabbat and festivals: some males even underwent a painful procedure that made it look like they weren't circumcised so that they could appear nude in the public arena like others. They threw in the tallit. If they had won, Judaism and our distinctive lifestyle and morals would no longer exist. Because they dared to be different, they'd rather fight than switch, the Maccabees cared deeply enough about their Judaism that they literally fought for more, and in the early days actually broadened their coalition to include others who opposed the acquiescence. Which is why the first rebellion ended when they won the right to run the Temple as they saw fit, and left the Seleucid government and its troops in place. Without the human component, the miracle wouldn't have occurred, the Temple not rededicated, Judaism gone, and accordingly the world as we know it.


Interestingly, now people often say that they don't believe in miracles, yet act, or behave, as if they expect miracles. As the food metaphor suggests, a miracle follows great effort. Expecting something to happen without that concomitant great human labor actually implies that one expects a miracle to occur. With no trouble. toil, trial, and tribulation, one relies on a miracle. In 1939, Vera Lynn, in the film Love Affair, sang, "Wishing Will Make It So" and it's been the basis of many movies since. As the Hanukkah story and its foods shows, this glib optimism defies reality. Wishes rarely accomplish anything unless combined with the hard work to make it a reality.

A student once asked the rabbi why God created skepticism, since God created everything for a beneficial purpose. The rabbi replied, "Sometimes, we shouldn't have much faith in God. When a poor person comes to you for help, do not send the person away, saying that God will provide by some miracle. In this case, don't believe that God will provide. Be skeptical. and provide for the person yourself." If we want Jews of Israel to survive, we must work at it. If we want to stand for integrity, honesty, generosity, etc., then we cannot wish it but must make the effort.

The story goes that after a lecture about miracles, the king asked the speaker to give an example of one. The person replied, "The Jews." The real miracle of Hanukkah is not the oil, but the fact that we're still here. We're here because some Jews in every generation refuse to give up their Judaism

and disappear. This ability to survive is the miracle, and it results from great effort, devotion, sacrifice, and dedication. Hanukkah reminds us that we believe in miracles, but the fried food reminds us that we don't live on miracles alone, but must work toward them. Happy Hanukkah.



BJ's and **Costco** also have pareve cookies in their bakeries.


