

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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS: Warm Fuzzies

Rabbi Sidney Greenberg some years ago told the story of a school lesson from the teacher of his six-year-old grand-daughter, Daniella. He asked her what she'd done in school that day. She replied, "We made warm fuzzies."

He asked what they were. She paused to find words that her grandfather could understand, and said, "Well, warm fuzzies are things that you say that make people feel good." She reached into her schoolbag and pulled out some to show him:

"You are my best friend."

"You are veeree prittee."

"Yu I like."

"I liek the prezint you gave mee."

He later thought, "How much easier life would be for all of us if we concentrated on handing out warm fuzzies to the people whose lives intersect our own in the course of any day....How long has it been since we gave a warm fuzzy to our children, our [significant others], the people who serve us, our brothers and sisters?"

What is a warm fuzzy? A compliment, an act of kindness, something that makes someone else feel better. Mark Twain famously wrote, “I can live on a good compliment two weeks, with nothing else to eat.*”

I’m from the Midwest. When I was growing up, we greeted everyone, unless it was rush hour in a crowd. We thanked the people behind the service counter. When I moved to NYC for college, I habitually continued it. I held the door open for people, especially if it would slam in the person’s face. In NYC, I talked to security guards and cafeteria workers. Everyone knew I wasn’t a New Yorker. Almost everyone responded.

Over the years, we’ve seen this type of civility lessen, and, in many ways, disappear. We no longer politely thank people, or ask after their welfare. They might believe in something else, or be of a different political party or religion or ethnicity or race. Sure, sometimes this politeness was pro forma, but sometimes an interesting or serious conversation ensued.

I recently heard a story from a Pittsburgher from back in the ‘70s, when for a brief period of time the gas shortage changed the way we lived, such as long gas lines because we could fill up the car only when our license plate indicated our turn. Christmas lights were missing that year. Pittsburghers took to luminaries. These lit candles sitting in sand in paper bags were everywhere. This woman’s father was very sick, and they couldn’t do it. Near Christmas, as she was driving home from the hospital, she saw them everywhere when she turned into her neighborhood, and she knew that they wouldn’t be in

their front yard. When she came up to her house, she saw that a neighbor had done it for them, knowing how sick her father was. Later, when she went through a bad divorce, a co-worker slipped her a note right before the holidays, saying that if she found herself too alone during the holidays, to call. She received two great, timely warm fuzzies.

The holidays are mostly over. Some will miss family and friends. Some won’t have seen them. We are back to our usual ways. Don’t: Look out for others. See if they’re ok. Thank the people who work security, clean the Temple (so what if they get paid). Thank all the volunteers who put tremendous energy into our Temple, and who don’t get paid for their outlays, both financially and in time. We have one of the friendliest synagogues, but we can do better. Just be happy to see people. You’d think coming from the pandemic, and trying to open up more as we used to be, we’d want to be more aware of others’ feelings and life circumstances, especially when we add our impatience for returning to normal. Say something nice (and if not, you’re better off saying nothing.)

Daniella learned this lesson long ago. Hopefully she remembers it today. As Rabbi Greenberg said, “Make warm fuzzies—today.”

Kenneth Wishnia was born in Hanover, N.H. He earned a B.A. from Brown University (1982) and a Ph.D. in comparative literature from SUNY Stony Brook (1996). He teaches writing and literature at Suffolk Community College in Brentwood, Long Island, where he is a professor of English. He is married to a wonderful woman from Ecuador and they have two children. Ken's novels include *23 Shades of Black*, which was nominated for the Edgar Allan Poe Award for Best First Novel and an Anthony for Best Paperback Original; *Soft Money*, a Library Journal Best Mystery of the Year; and *Red House*, a Washington Post Book World "Rave" Book of the Year. His novel, *The Fifth Servant*, was an Indie Notable selection, a Best Jewish Book of the Year, according to the Association of Jewish Libraries and the Jewish Press, won a Premio Letterario ADEI-WIZO, and was a finalist for the Sue Feder Memorial Historical Mystery Award, a category of the Macavity Awards. "Wishnia's brand of gritty surrealism jolts the reader with startling images and jarring contrasts. [He] evokes a country and a culture vividly and unforgettably."

A.J. Sidransky is an avid student of history, focusing on the personal experience of everyday people faced with extraordinary circumstances. As a member of a family ravaged by the Holocaust, he is determined to tell the stories of refugees and survivors that he has known. Telling the stories of adversity isn't limited to the Holocaust. He hopes to bring to light the stories of those who have triumphed over oppression, from Hitler's Germany to Soviet Russia, from Trujillo's Dominican Republic to Castro's Cuba, to the struggles of two peoples in the Holy Land and beyond. A.J. was born in the Bronx and lives in Washington Heights with his wife, a political advertising consultant.



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
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Leaves on the Tree of Life
